MEETING ROUNDUP

Thirteen years ago Tammy Kaehler was earning her living as a technical writer. Today, she's doing technical writing by assignment, while concentrating on her Kate Reilly mystery series for Poisoned Pen Press, which debuted in 2011 with "Dead Man's Switch."

It's a journey that began when she "awakened one day with a scene in my head." She went on to take a course taught by writer-writing coach Leslie Keenan, at the popular Marin County bookstore, Book Passage. The topic: Is There a Book in You?

It turned out there was – to date, there've been four – but, it wasn't until Tammy's day job introduced her to the auto racing arena that she found the setting for her novels. It happened in 2004; she was working for a sub-prime mortgage company that sponsored a racing team. "And I got an inside look at the business," recalls Tammy, the featured guest at our May meeting.

Dressed in jeans and a polo shirt emblazoned with the names of sponsors for the fictional racing character she created, along with pink Converse sneakers from the Indy 500 team of (real-life) female racer Pippa Mann, who is partnered with Susan G. Komen (the non-profit involved in the fight against breast cancer), Tammy spoke to us on "Going for the Finish Line ... Writing, Racing, and Research."

In addition to charting her career, she offered writing advice, and brought cool props – including a racing helmet and fire suit.

Recalling her introduction to the racing domain, she says, “I discovered it embraced drama, money, competition, passion, speed and celebrity.” After all, adds Tammy, “Racers are like rock stars.” At the same time, racing is a close knit community. “It has glamour and glitz and show and violence – and a sense of dichotomy.”

Tammy, whose favorite mystery author is Dick Francis – famed for his books involving horse racing – set out to become the Dick Francis of auto racing. Her protagonist, Kate Reilly, deals with the business of racing while also dealing with the needs of family and friends, the latter involving mysteries. As Tammy likes to say of Kate, she’s a character who “rides the edge between control and chaos, speed and death.”

Kate doesn’t win her races, but she always achieves something. “I am a sucker for stories of personal achievement,” Tammy explains, adding, “I’ve always been drawn to stories of women who are making advances in atypical arenas. Also, I like stories where things go right, at the end. I like a sense of order.”

Cleverly, each of Kate’s books has been set at a different race. Her latest, “Red Flags,” takes place at the Long Beach Grand Prix, Tammy’s hometown. It’s a device that helps to determine structure, because of the location and duration (running time) of each respective race.

Her research consists of talking to everyone she can, especially drivers. She attends races, and watches a lot of racing on YouTube. And, though she readily admits that she’s not the world’s most aggressive driver, she took a three-day racing course in Atlanta, Georgia, so she could know, first-hand, what it’s like to be behind the wheel where the high stakes involve life or death.

“Racers have to have the focus and concentration of jet fighter pilots. If they have a lapse in concentration, they could go right into the wall.”

To ensure that her racing scenes are authentic, she sends those sections of her manuscripts to the pros – for their critiques.

That kind of attention to detail has led to three different awards in automotive journalism, including the 2014 Motorsports Book of the Year, from the American Auto Racing Writers and Broadcasters Association (AARWBA), for the book, “Avoidable Contact.”

It’s a passion that continues. Shortly after speaking to us, Tammy was planning to attend the 100th running of the Indy 500, where she was going to work in the pit. And while at the Long Beach Grand Prix, she got to take a spin in a car driven by legendary racer Mario Andretti.

Tammy’s talk was preceded by a Writer’s Forum, where we discussed the challenges of writing a book series. Among the issues raised:

--Should you have a sidekick?

--How old is your protagonist, and how do you “age” them as the series progresses? Then again, maybe they don’t age.

--In referencing previous cases in books, how do you avoid spoilers for those who’ve yet to read a prior title? Guest speaker Tammy Kaehler had a ready response: She never names the murderer of a previous book. If she mentions the case, she doesn’t give away its resolution.




